

The Bachelor of Science in Nursing 1+2+1 Collaborative Curriculum prepares students to earn their **Registered Nurse (RN) and BSN in four years.** The completion of the collaborative curriculum is based on students taking coursework at Washington & Jefferson College (W&J) **and** Washington Health System School of Nursing (WHSSN). The **collaborative curriculum academic pathway** allows students to receive a **RN diploma in their junior year** and a **BSN in their senior year.** The mission of the W&J nursing collaborative curriculum is to prepare a highly qualified, competent, and educated diverse student population to practice professional nursing through innovation and service. We are committed to creating a **student-centric learning environment** grounded in academic rigor with the **blending of the liberal arts and sciences**, and the science of nursing that will enhance the essential skills and abilities needed for the discipline of nursing.

Employment & Other Opportunities

Important: Upon acceptance to the College, incoming first-year students who desire admission as a pre-nursing major will be evaluated on their readiness to complete program requirements to determine eligibility for enrollment in their sophomore year of the WHSSN pre-licensure curriculum. All applicants to the pre-nursing program must complete the listed prerequisites and must meet additional academic requirements, safety, and technical standards per WHSSN requirements and per W&J post-licensure RN-BSN program requirements. Active unencumbered RN licensure is required for continuation in the senior year post-licensure RN-BSN curriculum at W&J.
